English

Only one you:

- Name recognition and writing: Fish tank of names, each child decorates paper fish with their name to add to class display, match name card to initial sounds.
- Exploring words and messages: message pebbles with words, speech bubbles to suggest what the fish might say.
- Writing about me: creating a class book, only one (name) who can... focus on CVC words.
- Fishy labels: labelling fish parts, identifying initial sounds and forming letters.
- Retelling and Rhymes: retelling the story with puppets. Create a rhyming wall of words in the book (fin, tin, win)

Families, families, families

- Story listening and prediction. Identifying family words and matching. Sequencing book.
- Rhyming families- identify rhymes from the book and generate more rhymes.
- Who's in my family? Label family pictures
- Speech bubbles.

Communication and Language

- Asking questions, sharing ideas and listening to each other.
- Expressing feelings and discussing these Colour Monster
- Following 2-part instructions and getting to know the classroom
- Joining in group activities and story times
- Showing confident and talking to others and taking turns to speak
- Using talk and language to share what they think.

Phonics

Level 1

Week 2: All About Me- Join in with songs and rhymes, explore the initial sounds of words, explore the sounds that instruments make.

Week 3: Superheroes- Make speech sounds clearly, copy body percussion sounds, think of rhyming words, break words into beats, and blend sounds.

Week 4: Farm Animals: Identify and name environmental sounds, make a range of animal sounds, copy a sequence of body sounds, make loud and quiet voice sounds, recognise and name instrumental sounds.

Week 5: Castles- Sing and move to the rhythm of a song, represent sounds using musical instruments, find words that rhyme, count the number of sounds in a word, and hear the initial sounds in words.

Level 2

Week 6: Identify and read: s, a, t, p and practise oral blending and segmenting.

Week 7: Identify and read: i, n, m, d and read HFW is, it, in, at.

Week 8: Identify and read: g, o, c, k and read captions.

Mark Making/Fine Motor Skills

Scissor skills: Cutting cardboard tubes, snipping paper, using tools effectively.

Dough Gym: Strengthening hands- squeeze it, pinch it, splat it.

Name writing: Dotty names, shaving foam, puzzle name.


